The different adaptations of *To Kill a Mockingbird* have endeared the story to actors and audiences. However, many (and by many, I mean me) complain that the adaptations fail to include powerful soliloquies for the actors.

So-lil-o-quy: an act of speaking one's thoughts aloud when by oneself or regardless of any hearers.

Write a theatrical monologue for one of the characters in *To Kill a Mockingbird*. (E.g., An enraged Bob Ewell explains why he must kill the Finch children.) You will be graded on characterization, point of view, and word choice.
